Meetings update

Cochrane Colloquium

The Cochrane Colloquium, and with it the Cochrane Information Retrieval Methods Group meeting, has not been held since 2018. (2019 = disrupted by civil unrest in Chile; 2020-2022 = COVID.)

The next Cochrane Colloquium will take place in London, UK from 3-6 Sept 2023. We are planning to hold an IRMG meeting there but it is unlikely that there will be facilities for it to be virtual / hybrid.

Cochrane Handbook for Systematic Reviews of Interventions

The fully revised Searching for and Selecting Studies chapter of the Cochrane Handbook, co-authored by a number of members of the IRMG, which was published, on behalf of IRMG, within Cochrane in July 2019 and more widely in December 2019, is being fully revised again during for publication in Sept 2023. This applies to both the main text of the Searching for and Selecting Studies chapter and the Technical Supplement, both of which were last re-published in February 2022. New Cochrane Handbook on systematic reviews of qualitative evidence / studies

A further Cochrane Handbook on systematic reviews of qualitative studies is also under development and this also has a chapter on searching for studies.

Cochrane Interactive Learning Modules update

As part of the update and revision of the Cochrane Interactive Learning Modules, the Searching for studies module underwent revision and was republished with the rest of the modules in Sept 2022. The press release noted that:

Module 3: Searching for studies have been thoroughly reworked to emphasise the essential role of Information Specialists in conducting systematic reviews.





As part of this round of updating, I removed all references to Information Specialists helping, assisting, guiding, supporting, providing help, assistance, guidance, support etc and reworded the text to indicate that it is the role of the IS to undertake searches as a collaborator with other members of the review team. (The same applies to the forthcoming updates of the Cochrane Handbook searching chapter mentioned above. All such wording has been removed / revised.) https://training.cochrane.org/interactivelearning

SuRe Info

(You may have a separate update on that from someone else? – but in case not:)

Many members of the Cochrane IRMG are involved in maintaining and developing the <u>SuRe Info</u> (<u>Summarized Research in Information Retrieval</u>) web site, providing updated research-based information relating to the information retrieval aspects of producing systematic reviews and health technology assessments. These updates are published every 6 months, under the leadership of Julie Glanville (UK) and Jaana Isojärvi (Finland).

Search Filter Resource

A number of members of the Cochrane IRMG are involved in maintaining and developing the InterTASC Information Specialists' Sub-Group Search Filter Resource, which aims to identify, assess and test published and unpublished search filters designed to retrieve research by study design or focus (as opposed to topic-specific filters). The editorial team consists of Julie Glanville, Carol Lefebvre, Paul Manson, Sophie Robinson, Igor Brbre and Lois Woods. Julie gave a presentation on the Search Filter Resource for the HTAi IRG on 1 June 2023. I'm not sure whether there was a recording for those of you who missed it but hopefully someone in the audience today will know!

Cochrane Evidence Synthesis and Methods journal

Cochrane released a new journal recently entitled *Cochrane Evidence Synthesis and Methods*. They are seeking volunteers to peer review articles, to bring an information retrieval methods perspective. The journal focusses on two separate areas:

different types of evidence syntheses across health and social care including scoping reviews, rapid reviews, evidence gap maps, brief reports

methods research evaluating how we plan, produce, and disseminate evidence syntheses.

The content should not overlap with Cochrane Reviews traditionally published in the Cochrane Library.

Please also consider the journal when you are considering where to publish your information retrieval research.

Cochrane IRMG held a joint panel session with the Campbell IRMG at the Campbell conference, What Works Global Summit (WWGS 18-20 Oct 2022), by invitation from Vivian Welch, the then interim CEO and Editor in Chief of the Campbell Collaboration, where I presented: "Cochrane guidance on searching for and selecting studies for systematic reviews: an evidence-based revision of the Cochrane Handbook for Systematic Reviews of Interventions".

Note: the Campbell guidance on searching for studies is based heavily on the Cochrane Handbook searching chapter, with our permission and encouragement!

IRMG and NICE

I continue to attend regular meetings of both the UK National Institute for Health and Care Excellence *Joint Information Group* and the *InterTASC Information Specialists' Sub-Group* to ensure close liaison between Cochrane, NICE and related organizations.

Promoting IRMG

I contributed, by invitation, a short piece entitled: 'Meet Carol Lefebvre from the Information Retrieval Methods Group', designed to bring a more personal touch to the Cochrane Methods Newsletter while showcasing the IRMG and promoting the role of Information Specialists within Cochrane. https://pages.cochrane.org/Methods-Newsletter-April-2023

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Cochrane re-organization

Last year, I reported that Cochrane was undergoing major organizational change and this is still ongoing. In March 2023, all the Cochrane Review Groups in the UK (c. half of the then c. 50 CRGs) lost their main source of funding and the majority of them have ceased to operate. With respect to Cochrane Information Specialists, the IRMG has tried to support CISs facing redundancy by forwarding any suitable job adverts seen on wider library and information science community lists to the CISs list and the IRMG list. FRAMEWORK FOR JOINT **HTA COOPERATION**



- » Joint scientific consultations (JSCs).
- » Identification of emerging health technologies.
- » Common procedures and methodologies across the EU.



KEY PRINCIPLES OF THE HTA REGULATION

- No economic assessment or any conclusion on pricing and reimbursement.
- » Driven by EU HTA bodies who remain responsible for drawing conclusions on added value for their health systems.
- » High quality, timeliness and transparency.
- » Use of joint work in national HTA processes.
- » Input from independent experts.
- » Stakeholder engagement and inclusiveness.
- » Progressive implementation.




- » Only on clinical domains of the assessment: » 12 January 2025: New oncology medicines and advanced therapy medicinal products will be assessed
 - » 13 January 2028: Orphan medicinal products to be added to the joint
 - » 13 January 2030: All new medicines will come under the scope of the regulation.





AND


- has experience in developing search strategies and conducting searches for HTAs, systematic reviews and / or other evidence syntheses (information specialist)

 - Ongoing confidential HTAs (for PCC members)
